In one of his novels entitled "Humiliated and Insulted," Dostoyevsky expressed his admiration for what sun rays can do with a human soul. The perceptible presence of the sun can inspire us to many things. One of the main characters of the novel watched the sunset on a sunny and frosty March day in St. Petersburg, Russia. The next post was about the movie by Frank Capra, entitled "Lost Horizon." Much of the story takes place in an exotic paradise called "Shangri-La." It is a land of eternal happiness where time stands still. A masterpiece from 1937 has its own unique history. The original version of the film lasted 132 minutes. During World War II, censorship cut 24 minutes from the original version of the movie to subdued its pacifist message. Archivist Robert Gitt spent over 25 years of his life to recreating the original version of the film. To this end, he searched film libraries around the world. Despite his efforts, several scenes from the original version of the work are still missing. In the version I watched, the missing scenes are replaced only by dialogues and photos. What is so amazing about this production? It shows us the lost world with one of the most pacifist messages in the history of cinematography. As a result of political turmoil, five people accidentally find themselves in an unearthly Tibetan land where order, peace, and longevity prevail. It is a land where people live for a thousand years, free from all diseases and worries.






EARTH WARS

The soldiers started firing. Some robots have been damaged, others destroyed.


