


• Cover: post "Inspired by Hiroshige"


I don't use Photoshop when editing my photos. This means that my images are digital photos, not technically twisted graphics. One significant advantage to using Lightroom (some would call it a disadvantage) is that you cannot edit pictures indefinitely (unlike Photoshop). Lightroom is a digital darkroom. All the tools that we have in this program were available to people who deal with analog photography. The difference is that in Lightroom, we edit photos virtually, not in a photographic darkroom. For me, images converted in Photoshop often falsify reality. As I mentioned earlier, we see this phenomenon in almost all advertisements. Therefore, I don't really plan on using Photoshop. I'm tired of presenting reality in a not entirely honest way. I try to show the reality around me, painfully honest. My goal is to give Warsaw simultaneously as it looks but through the prism of my specific, artistic perspective.

In the post entitled "Focus," I wrote that I recommend that you direct your strength and power to something that will benefit you, your loved ones, your local community (not necessarily virtual), and the whole society. Start focusing on what's really important. The most important criterion you must meet to do this is that you are happy. How can this be done? We can certainly: play sports, develop, work, learn, read, write, take pictures or, in general, create something out of nothing. I encourage you, my Dear Friend, to focus on this type of activity. If possible, try to avoid passivity, e.g., useless scrolling on your smartphone, limit your TV viewing, or strongly restrict your alcohol consumption. My blog started in September 2017. I only knew that publishing on social networks is something that interests me little.

Now I know that: taking photos, writing a post, and blogging all make sense. In the long run, focusing on an artistic activity will bring benefits (both material and non-material) to me and my relatives and society. That is why I strongly encourage you, my Dear Friend, to start a prolific artistic activity and focus on it. You will help not only yourself but also other people. As I wrote earlier, broadly understood action does not have to be related to art. It could be something related to sports, science, and so on. If you start focusing on activities that make you happy, that keep you moving forward, and that requires some effort from you, that effort will surely be rewarded. Stay calm, focus on your passion, be patient, and, most of all, enjoy what you do. Nevertheless, while realizing your potential, do not forget about your loved ones. Do not neglect your relationship with them by having fun with your hobby.






AUDIENCE

I was wrong for a lot of my art activities. I thought the audience was not an essential part of the play (post: "Audience"). It happened in the initial phase of my activity. For a long time, I photographed in the streets of Warsaw without publishing photos. This situation lasted for over a year. I didn't think about the recipients of my photos. I felt that I was taking pictures for myself and that maybe I would never publish them. Thanks to the first photo exhibition, which took place in June 2018, I am aware that art does not exist without an audience. When I saw people arriving at a particular place to see my paintings at a specific time, I realized that viewers are a key, indispensable part of the entire artistic process. Then, at one point, I found out that people really like what I do and want to talk about it. Does this mean that I have not received such signals before? Of course not, but in this case, just a lot of the positive aspects were combined at one point. The photo exhibition was a real breakthrough in the way I began to perceive the public. Thanks to this experience, I know that my photos have received a completely new life in viewers' minds. The truth is, I have no influence on this life. I would call this phenomenon that I am trying to transfer experiences to an audience. My thoughts are encoded in my photos. It is up to the viewers how they interpret and decode my images. The viewer sees the work, translates, and transforms what he sees through his personal, intimate point of view. Undoubtedly, this is the moment when a work of art is reborn. I believe that this process takes place when I watch paintings by Salvador Dali, for example. Or when I'm reading a book by Stanislaw Lem or listening to David Bowie's music. I transform their masterpieces into my own coded, mysterious language. This process takes place in my imagination. I'm sure all of the listed geniuses also knew that their artistic activity would be nothing without the audience, readers, listeners, fans, or viewers. Finally, I would like to thank all the people who helped me in organizing my exhibitions (both in the Przystawki restaurant and in the office of my employer at that time), all those who helped me prepare my diploma thesis, and, finally, all the viewers who came to see my photos.


INSPIRED BY HIROSHIGE

The last post published in 2018 was called "Inspired by Hiroshige." According to the book by Lorenzo Bichler entitled "Hiroshige" (published by Taschen), the eponymous painter was one of the last great artists of the ukiyo-e tradition. Ukiyo-e, a kind of painting and woodcut, means "pictures of the passing world." It was a unique genre of Japanese art. It flourished between the 17th and 19th centuries. Ukiyo-e has shaped the visual image of Japan in the Western world. Hiroshige inspired painters such as Vincent van Gogh: "Blossoming Plum (by Hiroshige)" and "Bridge in the Rain (by Hiroshige)" or James Abbott McNeill Whistler ("Nocturne in Blue and Gold - Old Battersea Bridge"). The ukiyo-e scenes often depicted the attractions of big cities. For the Japanese painter, the city in which he worked was Edo - today's Tokyo.

Beautiful women, actors, city life, and spectacular scenery are the focus of Hiroshige's work. My favorite theme in the work of the Japanese genius is painting trees, with particular emphasis on wavy branches. It was with great joy that I photographed the branches of the trees before getting to know the woodcuts painted by Hiroshige. When I saw his works, I realized once again in my life how artists draw inspiration from their surroundings. The painter's paintings inspired me to search for wavy tree branches in Warsaw. Hiroshige was best known for portraying landscapes. His most famous series of masterpieces was called "One Hundred Famous Views of Edo." A Japanese artist created them in the years 1856-1858. Edo is presented in all seasons.

Here I see another trait in common between Hiroshige and me. The truth is that I photograph Warsaw in any weather. I try to present Warsaw the way it looks, without any coloring. Regardless of whether it is a hot, sunny day or a bitter frost outside - I take pictures. Even extreme weather cannot stop me. I realize that I can still get a lot of inspiration from Hiroshige. His works look as if they were frozen in time. Walking through the streets of Warsaw, I often try to do the same - to keep a part of the Polish capital for posterity. The Japanese painter will remain an unparalleled role model for me to capture Warsaw for future generations.
