

Therefore, I believe that there will be geniuses in every period of mankind whose works will be admired by other people. But personally, I don't have time for contemporary artists. Probably the surrounding area would be very distracting for me. Working amid the hustle and bustle does not serve me well. What are the conclusions from the first part of my post? The decisions are simple: I don't want fame. I don't need fame. I do not expect interviews, vernissages, meetings with fans, etc. Does this mean that I do not respect the people who visited my photo exhibition and visited my website? Of course not. The audience and the reception of works are critical aspects of artistic activity. However, I know that universal recognition would not serve my creative work. I think if I became a celebrity, my productivity would drop. I am also afraid that I would "have to" drink alcohol with other people. This substance is not helping my writing. I'm not like Charles Bukowski. My creativity does not improve with the amount of alcohol consumed. The famous American writer could drink all day and, in the meantime, write novels or poetry. I am the opposite of such a creative process. To be artistically prolific, I feel that I need a quiet life without crowds, flashes, and screaming fans. I don't want to be recognized in the streets. I prefer to focus only on creating. Let fame cover other people and let me be alone.

ART AS A DIALOGUE


