

- c) the drill would be built to be brought back to the Earth's surface at any time and replaced with a new one.



Non-Polish speakers cannot appreciate the wisdom, magic, and artistry hidden in the words of Polish performers. I doubt that translating these songs into English would be a good idea. Nevertheless, in the context of international success for non-English-speaking bands, there are positive exceptions. However, I think the general rule is that if a song is not written and sung in English, getting to the top will be a difficult task. An exceptional song by a Hungarian band confirms the rule.

ABOUT "DIARIES"



While thinking about all this, I began to wonder if Taschen would be interested in publishing a book about my artistic activity. I didn't ask them about it. I think for today, they would simply refuse.


Nevertheless, after a while, I was reminded that Fyodor Dostoevsky self-published much of his writing. The famous Russian novelist was involved in this activity from 1873 until he died in 1881. Both the Taschen publishing house and Dostoevsky's 19th-century publishing activities gave me a hint that I could create my own albums. This is how the seed of the idea for "Diaries" formed in my mind. I immediately began to wonder if I had the right tools for this kind of play. I don't have and can't use Adobe InDesign. Fortunately, there are applications like Visme. With this program, I saved time and energy to learn Adobe InDesign. Visme is very intuitive. I can design a new "Diaries" issue within a few hours.
